Thoughts on Macro Photography

Macro photography is extreme close-up photography. Typically the subjects are very small, and a true macro photo is one in which the size of the image on the sensor compared to the actual size of the subject is captured in a 1:1 ratio. The best method, if you're serious about working in this photographic genre, is to use a dedicated macro lens. These come in a variety of focal lengths, including 60mm, 90mm, 100mm, 105mm, and 180mm. Less expensive options are to use extension tubes or close-up filters, although sharpness might suffer. Also, most digital camers have a macro or close-up mode.

Depth of field is very small in macro work and often requires an f stop of f16 or greater to get everything you want in focus. These small

aperatures can often make lighting the subject a challenge.

The most common subjects for this type of photography are flowers and insects, but the macro world isn't limited to these. Focusing on



photograph something simply for 'what it is', but for 'what else' it is."

Mike Moats is an accomplished macro photographer. He has quite a few videos on the subject on <u>youTube</u>. <u>com</u>. Also check out his website <u>tinylandscapes.com</u> if you are interested in seeing and learning more about macro photography.


